


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

The Children's Cottage Society has officially moved into our brand new Child and Family Centre after embarking on construction in April 2022. We are fulfilling our goal to provide space for 40% more children in our new Crisis Nursery and accommodate hundreds of additional families in the learning and support programs offered through our Family Resource Network and Child Development Centre.



Back in 2013, the Children's Cottage Society was given a donation that enabled us to purchase three plots of land on Home Road NW for our new centre. Over the next decade, research was done, architectural designs rendered, collaborations formed, and campaigns created, with the goal of extending our capacity to support every family that reaches out to us and help their children be safe and thrive. Ten years later and we're finally here!

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
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

Outcomes From Our Work



92% of parents from the Early Years program increased their knowledge about the healthy growth and development of their children.



Positive parenting skills are regularly taught by our Home Visitation Program. 91% of parents in the program improved their parenting skills.



The Nurturing Newborn program's assessment of parents showed that 100% of parents were feeling more prepared to care for their children because of this program.



99% of parents report that, after receiving crisis care, they felt better able to meet their children's needs as a parent.



Satisfaction with support provided by staff at Brenda's House is paramount. 85% of families described their experience as "feeling truly cared for" at the shelter.



CRISIS NURSERY

The Crisis Nursery, located on the second floor of our Child & Family Centre in Montgomery, provides up to 3 days of 24/7 care in a safe, playful, and nurturing setting. The Crisis Nursery accepts children from newborn to age 9 and has the capacity to care for up to 20 children per day. Care is available to parents and legal guardians, and support is provided to them during and after their child's care to help resolve the family crisis that brought them to the Nursery, where needed.



Sarah's Story:

Sarah and Mike are parents to a 3-year-old little girl named Madison. Sarah struggled with parenting and was afraid that she might hurt her child. When she realized she needed help, she reached out to the Crisis Nursery.

"I experienced a lot of serious trauma as a child caused by my parents. Unfortunately, a lot of what you know about parenting comes from your parents, so when my daughter was born, I was worried I would be like them but the Crisis Nursery and my Family Coach helped me replace what I learned from my parents with really good, nurturing parenting skills. I still have bad days, but I know I can always refer back to what my coaches taught me. I've come so far and I'm really proud of that."

We taught Sarah:

- To be nurturing.
- To incorporate positive parenting strategies.
- To use coping strategies to decrease her stress so that it did not affect her daughter.
- To use the Crisis Nursery when she had bad days to make sure that her daughter would be safe and not be exposed to toxic stress.

FAMILY WELLBEING

Family Coaching, through an in-home visitation model of service, is available to families who have accessed the Crisis Nursery. Family Coaches support the setting of personalized goals, provide information regarding parenting and child development, and build connections to community resources.

A Family Coach started working with the Adebayo family because their son had recently been diagnosed with autism, which they were unfamiliar with. The coach helped them understand what this diagnosis meant for them and their family, and helped them apply for Family Support for Children with Disabilities (FSCD) funding. Once that was secured, the Family Coach helped their son get into a specialized school, and connected them with a team of therapists, a behavioural aide, and respite services.

CCS has continued to support the family as their needs have changed over the years and have been so happy to help him continue to flourish. Recently, the parents passed their citizenship test and became Canadian Citizens. Their Family Coach was honoured to be invited to the swearing in ceremony. The day was filled with happy tears, laughter and hugs.

"It's a blessing to have a group around us who are rooting for us and trying their best to help no matter the circumstances. It's definitely been a relief in many ways and I look forward to the future, thanks to the Children's Cottage Society!"





CALGARY WEST FAMILY RESOURCE NETWORK

The Family Resource Network is a provincial initiative that ensures every community in the province has a place where families can go to access supports.



"Recently, we had a family walk in who was struggling with meeting their basic needs, and concerns about having enough was high on their list of priorities. This family ask for immediate food resources, as they did not have anything in the home to feed their children. The family browsed our free food pantry for items we provide in partnership with the 'Spinz-Around' program. The family was able to take enough to get them through the week until we were able to provide them with emergency gift cards for groceries while helping them to come up with a more long-term solution for their basic needs struggles. The family shared how relieved they were to receive such quick and kind support in their time of need."

761 vulnerable families, including 1630 children, had access to free resources and activities through the Calgary West Family Resource Network.



Hope In Action With The Hope's Cradle

Our new Centre is host to Calgary's first ever safe and anonymous infant surrender site, the Hope's Cradle. This life-saving alternative is made possible through our partnership with Gems for Gems and collaboration with the Calgary Police Service, the Calgary Fire Department, and City of Calgary.

We are also thankful for the support of key donors who helped us add the Hope's Cradle to our new Centre, providing safety and hope for infants when a parent is in a desperate situation and makes the difficult decision that they cannot keep their baby.

BRENDA'S HOUSE

Brenda's House provides temporary shelter for homeless families along with support to move back into their own housing quickly, and assistance with basic needs, referrals, child development and wellbeing services while in shelter.

Amelia's Family Story:

Amelia and her two daughters came to Calgary to flee an unsafe situation. They had no family to help and no place to stay, so they found themselves at Brenda's House.

"When we landed in Calgary, we didn't know anybody. We were scared and tired. I was lucky enough to come across Brenda's House and they welcomed us in the very day we got here. My girls loved it there. I don't think they even knew they were in a homeless shelter. Volunteers provided so many fun activities for them to do. This was like a distraction for them while I figured out how to get our life back together. Now we are together in a home where we are finally starting our life over.

We helped Amelia:

- To shelter her family when she was homeless.
- To reduce the trauma of homelessness for her children by providing a room of their own and activities to help life feel normal.
- To connect to appropriate community resources including counselling services for domestic violence survivors.



HOMELINKS HOUSING PROGRAM


Families in shelter can request support from the HomeLinks program to help them locate affordable housing, get assistance with moving and furnishings, access rent subsidies and other financial assistance where eligible, and receive follow-up in the community for up to two years to help them learn new skills and/or connect with resource to stay successfully housed and become self-sufficient.

Marisol's Success Story:

Marisol's first goal was to find affordable housing that would fit her family's needs. She reached out to Home Links and they assisted her in finding a duplex, large enough for three children, in a familyfriendly community. Her next goal was to get her children back living with her. She did this by connecting to community resources that would ensure a safe and stable home. This included accessing the Food Bank when there was no food in the house. Jessica's third goal was to ensure her addiction issues were being addressed so that her children could remain in her home. Jessica attended addictions counselling programs and has been clean and sober for two years. Her hard work has ensured that her children have remained in the home for nearly two years.

"I am generally happy for the first time in my life. I am sober and I have all my kids with me in a safe house. It wasn't easy for me to get here and my case manager made me work really hard. But because of her, I have everything I need. I set goals with her, and she made me accountable to them. I'm doing so well now and I have no fear that my kids will be taken away. We are a real family and I'm hopeful for our future."

86% of HomeLinks families were able to benefit from the program and move into a home to call their own in 2023-24.





HOME VISITATION

The Home Visitation program offers parents of children, newborns to age six, weekly home visits with an experienced family support worker (Home Visitor) who can help them build on their strengths, develop their parenting knowledge and skills, increase their understanding of child development, and connect them to community resources and services relevant to their unique family needs.



Building Parent Confidence

A young mother who had recently had a baby, now seven months old, reached out for help because she wanted to better understand his development and learn about positive parenting.

Despite her initial anxiety regarding her son's premature birth and meeting developmental milestones, she was reassured by the developmental screening provided for her child. Completing the screening questionnaires with her worker and taking the time to talk about the results helped this young mother understand that her baby was on schedule in every area, which greatly alleviated her anxiety.

Mom learned how to support her child's development, and build her own parenting confidence and skills with the help of her Home Visitor. She also received help with referrals to access community resources. This support not only relieved her financial worries but also reinforced her commitment to positive parenting and her child's growth.

EARLY YEARS FAMILY SUPPORT

This program provides in-home support service to at-risk new parents and their infants through a collaboration with Alberta Health Services and Calgary Police Services in Calgary. Family Life Coaches work closely with these vulnerable families to keep them together and prevent the need for their infants to be placed in foster care. The Coaches provide parenting guidance and teach child care skills to ensure safety, healthy child development, and wellbeing in the home. Coaches also connect parents to other support in the community to address risk factors and build their network of support.

"When Luke and Simone were referred to our program, Children's Services had concerns about his history of substance use and his ability to care for and provide a safe home for his children with his partner. While Luke was in a period of sobriety, he had experienced a relapse during his partner's pregnancy. There were also concerns related to adequate housing for the family and worries about Simone's mental health.

While in the program, the parents were supported in following through with the plan outlined by Children's Services and took steps to address their concerns, in order to demonstrate that they could be a safe and reliable parents. Luke completed an addiction treatment program and the family was assisted in building a network of support to encouraged and guide them. Luke acknowledged that sobriety was key to keeping their young family together. Finding adequate housing was a challenge, but the parents persevered in their search and with the support of a community program they secured better housing for their family. Luke and Simone learned to recognize their strengths as parents and how to navigate challenges. Simone developed healthy coping and problem-solving skills to improve her mental health, and she learned to value and nurture herself so she could be there for her children. to her health. NUTURING NEWBORNS

Nurturing Newborns (formerly In-Home Infant Respite Program) offers prenatal support as well as infant respite care for isolated families who lack support, with babies aged newborn to 6 months. By providing regular weekly respite for 3-4 hours, parents who are overwhelmed or exhausted can take the time to rest, engage in self-care activities, and make connections or access needed services in the community.



"This program for me is more than just providing care for babies, it is a way to give nurturing to a struggling family. By supporting a mom this way, it is an entire family's life that is changing. I don't know how I would have been without this program, but I know I was not far from depression. Having my Respite Care Worker come over every Monday was a high point in my life because this was such a kind and intentional woman. Sincerely, I am lacking words to express all my gratitude to this program and especially to my Respite Care Worker."

100% of parents felt more prepared to care for their children because of this program.

How The Brain Story Weaves Into Our Programming

The Children's Cottage Society has integrated the science of brain development into all the programs and services that we offer. Knowing that early years are important windows of opportunity for us to set a strong foundation for healthy brain development, every CCS employee completes the Brain Story online training which was developed by the Alberta Family Wellness Initiative. In all our programs we integrate support to help parents meet the development needs of their children. By applying this strength-based prevention and early intervention framework, CCS improves long-term outcomes for children, families and communities.

Here are examples of how we support the healthy brain development of children:



Our Crisis Nursery program through the provision of respite care for children under the age of 10 years reduces a parent's stress during a time of adversity thereby protecting children from exposure to toxic stress.



Our Home Visitation and Early Years programs through the provision of home-based coaching and educational supports build parenting capacity for caregivers and through skill building supports all family members to build resilience.



Brenda's House prevents all family members from exposure to toxic stress through the provision of a safe place to stay while experiencing homelessness.



Our Nurturing Newborns program through the provision of community-based respite care reduces a parent's stress and adds positive supports to a family.



Our Family Resource Network provide positive supports to build skills through the provision of on-site family supports programming.



Our HomeLinks program helps to remove toxic stress and build a stable home environment for children through the provision of case management programming.

I remember one little boy about 4 years old, he taught me and the staff how to do the Michael Jackson moon walk. That made my day, and he got the biggest cuddle from me. This is why I volunteer.”

In 2023 we received support from 1076 Volunteers, including individuals and groups. They contributed more than **14,479 hours**, equivalent to **\$343,144** in financial value provided.

Did you know that we had 210 volunteers contribute over 800 hours to help us get through the busy holiday season?




Students Play An Important Part In Our Success

The Crisis Nursery, Family Coaching, and the Family Resource Network benefited from the involvement of practicum students from the faculties of Occupational Therapy, Social Work, Early Childhood Education, and Child and Youth Care from the University of Lethbridge, Lethbridge College, Mount Royal University, Ambrosia University, the University of Calgary, and the University of Alberta.

As these students learn from us, we also learn from them! They support Cottage staff in caring for children and help support the parents and caregivers. Our practicum students also assist staff with program planning and facilitation, support on-site activities with families and children, and help with client intake and referral processes. We have hired some practicum students on completion of their tenure with us.

CCS also works with several of the University of Calgary’s volunteer groups. Music Box is a weekly program that teaches young children the basics of music. The UofC Club facilitates various craft and baking sessions with children at the FRN, and the Home Food Group runs cooking sessions with families via Zoom, teaching children basic cooking skills and nutrition.





Support From Our Community Groups And Businesses

As an agency, our collaborations and partnerships extend our reach into the community and provide families with better access to a wide range of supports.

Our Commitment To Reconciliation

About 40% of the children and families we serve identify as Indigenous. Our goal to build resilient children in healthy families includes forging meaningful relationships with Indigenous communities.

One such example is a reconciliation-themed collaboration between our Family Coaching program and Stoney Health Services at the Stoney Nakoda Nation in Morley. Together we developed and implemented a customized Family Coaching program to meet the unique needs of Indigenous families in the Morley community. The Children's Cottage Family Coaching program also supported Stoney Health Services' own home visitation program by providing information on parenting support and healthy child development.

In exchange, our staff received guidance and learning opportunities to better understand and support the Indigenous children and families we serve in our urban programs.



The onsite work helped build cultural competencies that we have adopted and continue applying to provide more robust support to Indigenous children and families in Calgary. The program is funded through the United Way Calgary and Area's Nattoo'si Indigenous Healing and Well-being Initiative, making it more sustainable over the long term.


